

Description of Services

Camp Quest immerses students in career explorations, volunteer opportunities and workshops that build direct life skills, field trips and much more! Each camp is designed to provide experiences that foster individual strengths and interests. In order to provide the best possible experience for camp, enrollment in each camp is limited to 20 students.

Registration Policy

Registration requires completion of all online registration forms by the client, health/accident insurance, and payment of all nonrefundable fees.

Tuition and Fees

Quest utilizes Rycor for payment of student fees. Rycor is a secure, streamlined system that enables parents to complete transactions through credit or debit card.

Tuition and fees are payable via credit/debit card only.

Tuition is due in full before the start of each class.

Check-In/Check-out

To assure that students are supervised while in our care, we employ the following system:

- Clients must maintain up to date contact information, including telephone numbers for all persons permitted to pick up their student.
- Each student must be checked into the program and be picked up from the program daily by the parent/guardian or other authorized person
- Picture identification is required for anyone to pick up a student when they are unknown to site personnel
- Students will only be released from the designated pick up area

Late pick-up fees are due immediately at the time of the occurrence.

Behavior Policy

Camp Quest staff are committed to provide a safe, positive and enriching environment for all students. Please review the following expectations of appropriate behavior:

1. Listening and following directions

2. Keeping hands, feet, legs and objects to self
3. Speaking in a normal tone of voice, in a courteous manner and utilizing acceptable language
4. Using materials and equipment appropriately
5. Following safety rules
